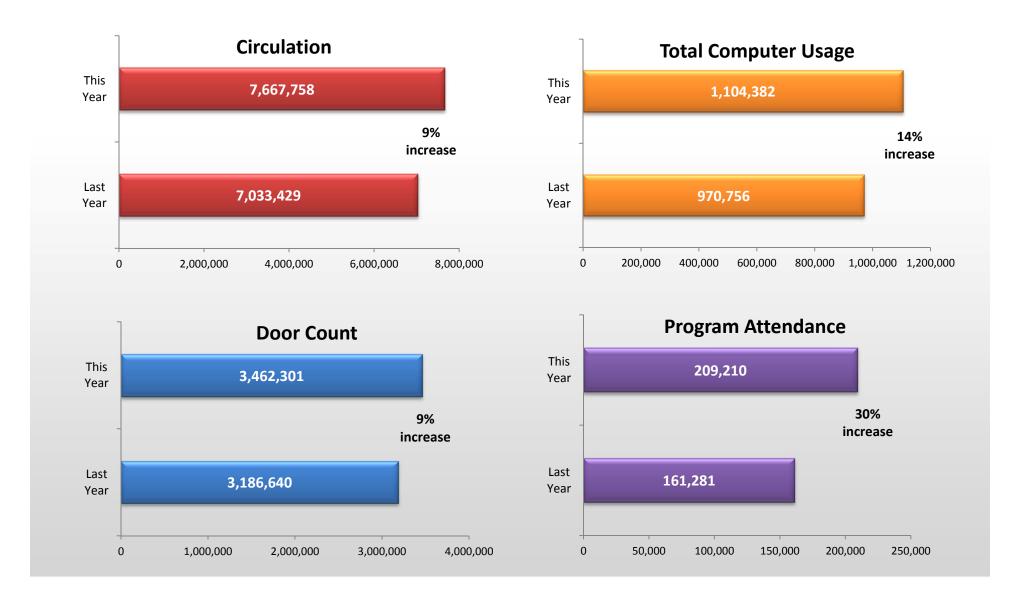

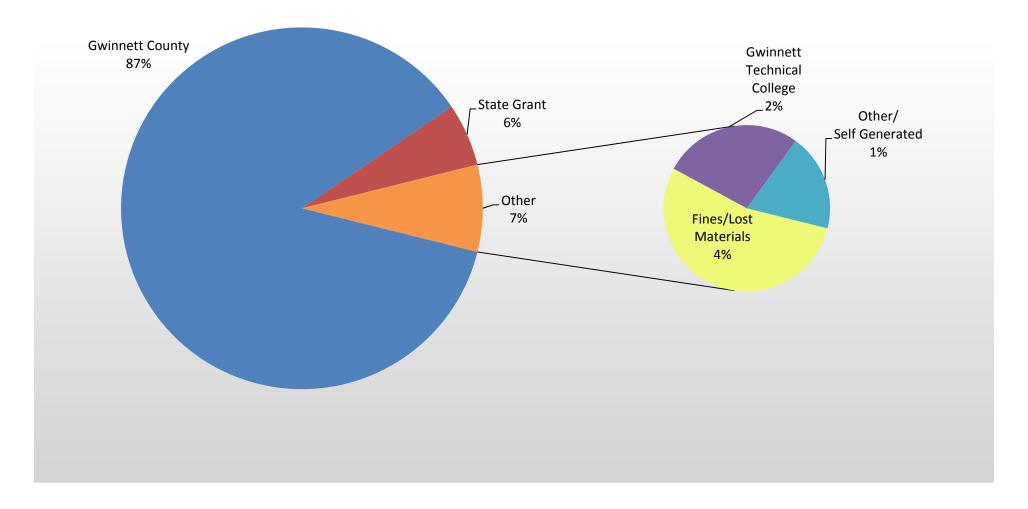

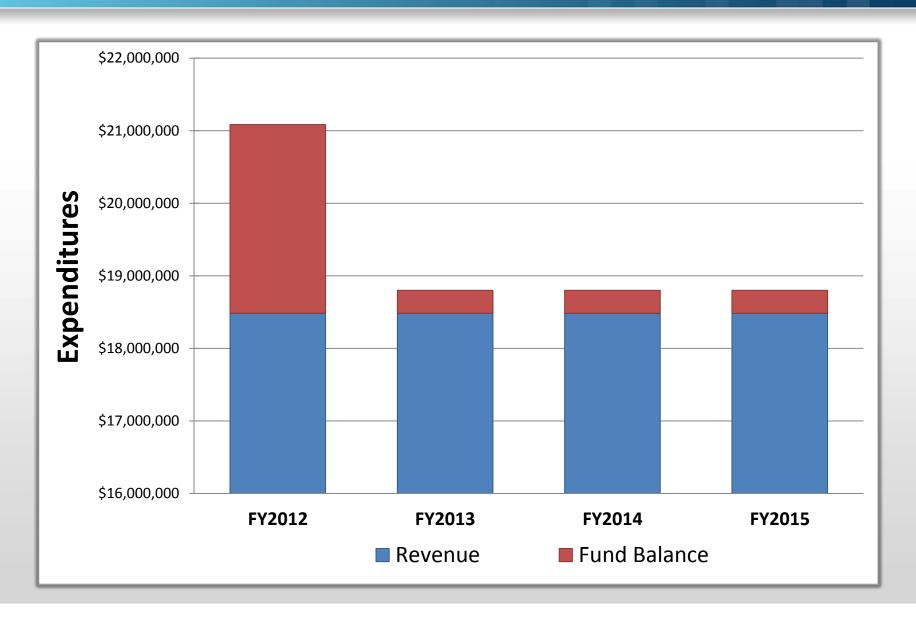
Library's 2012 Budget Request to County

Library Revenue

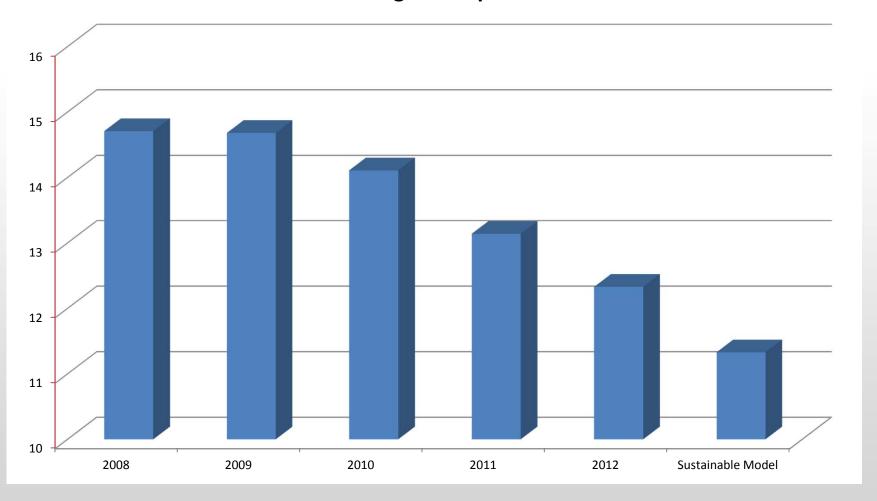


Use of Library Resources 2011 - 2015



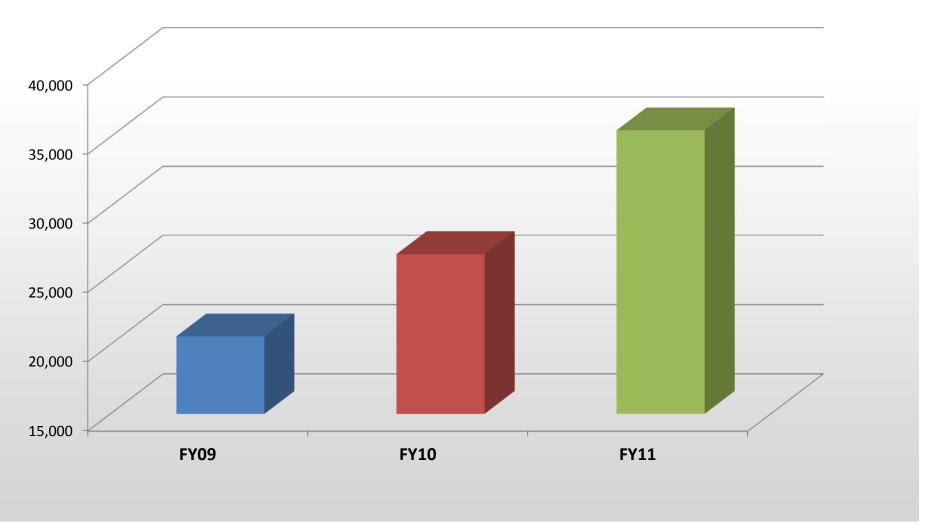
New Staffing/Service Model

Service Impacts

Reduction in Open Hours

- From 53 hours per week to 40 hours
- From 7 days open to 5 days open a week

Reduction in Materials, Personnel, Operations

- Fewer items available (books, magazines, audiobooks, eBooks, databases, DVDs)
- Inability to meet state standard of "full" materials acquisitions
- Longer wait times for materials
- Less staff to:
 - assist with customer information needs/requests
 - technology needs, research, job search, homework help
 - maintain safe library environment
 - circulate and process materials
- Less programming for all ages
- Reduced computer access and longer wait times
- Longer technology upgrade cycles
- Increased computer and network down times

Engage Gwinnett Recommendations

Engage Gwinnett Recommendations are categorized in two sections:

- Status Quo Complete
- Declining Digest



Responses to "Status Quo" recommendations -

- The Library funding was reduced 15%; \$2.8M
- The Library has implemented an efficient staffing model
- The Library has identified automated systems and other technologies
- The Library continues to review ways to add revenue
- In FY2011, the number of volunteers increased 46% and the number of volunteer hours increased 33%
- The Library Board have discussed efforts to gain private sector support to help offset this loss of funding during these difficult times particularly as library use continues to soar

Engage Gwinnett Recommendations

"Declining Digest" recommendations to Board of Commissioners

- Reduce County funding to the Library by \$6.5M or 33%; anticipate:
 - Closure of four library branches across the system
 - Immediate transition to a flexible library system.
 - Convert closed libraries to other uses
 - Significant increase in user fees for past due books; interlibrary exchanges
- Urge Library Board to aggressively leverage the opportunity for sponsorship
- Increase target volunteer hours to 200,000 within 5 years
